# The Spiritual Benefits of Lenten Observance

My Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus, fraternal salutations from the office of your PP. As we are in the middle of the Lenten season, our Church demands us to examine our behavioural and cognitive patterns whether they are as per God's law. Lent is the holy season where in our Heavenly Father invites us to return to him with all our heart; an opportunity to seek healing and to know the transforming mercy of God. As followers of Christ, we are required to practice the three pillars of Lenten observance namely: prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Pope Francis said in his Ash Wednesday homily, 'Lent is also a privileged time for prayer', He quoted St. Augustine, who described fasting and almsgiving as "the two wings of prayer," because they are signs of humility and charity. Prayer offers us all a very special opportunity to grow in our relationship with God and to deepen our commitment to a way of life, rooted in our baptism. In our busy world, Prayer provides us with an opportunity to reflect upon our patterns and sins. We should pray more deeply, experience sorrow for what we've done and failed to do, and to be generous to those in need.

Giving alms, Jesus teaches, means making the needs of others our own, especially the needy of our world. They are all around us: children and the old, the sick and the suffering, families and individuals, next-door neighbours and people in lands faraway.

Whatever we give should be something of ourselves, something that costs us. We will receive blessings from God in return. What shall we give to the needy this lent? In deciding, decide generously. After all, before us is the great almsgiver-Jesus gave: "He loved us, and gave himself up for us."



Fasting is tied closely to almsgiving and this presents an opportunity to feel the pain of deprivation of physical needs of the unfortunate ones of our society. Our traditional theology says that it burns out the fat of sin and spiritual impurities. It brings about god's compassion and forgiveness so that our minds may be purified, our hearts will become sanctified and our soul will be beautified by God, the Creator.

These are the real consequences of our Lenten observance of prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

My Dear Brothers and Sisters, As we walk the path ahead, I pray that May God's mercy flow like mountain streams, falling like the morning dew. May the healing balm of forgiveness wash away our iniquity, cleanse us from our sin and lead us to a joyful celebration of the Risen Lord on Easter Sunday.

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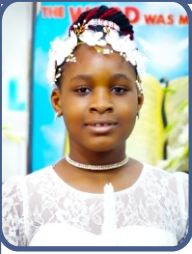
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# My journey to my first holy communion

Thanks to the teachers who helped to prepare me.

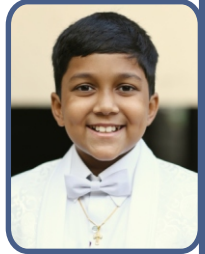
Thanks to the friends I made during this period.

# Confirmation 2021-22 batch

The confirmation for the children of the 2021-22 batch was held on 5th February 2022 at 6.30 pm in our church Our Lady of Visitation. Reverend Bishop Allwyn D'silva and our Priest-in charge Fr. Arul Manickam (O.Praem) were the main celebrants, alongwith 3 other co-celebrants.

There were totally 54 of our youth (32 boys and 22 girls) who received this sacrament. 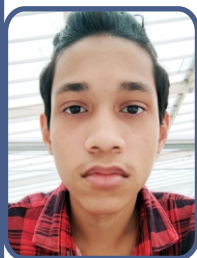
The Confirmation day went very well and there was full co-operation of the parents, the children and the youth (ushers) who made this program a success.

Just as Baptism gives new life, Eucharist nourishes life, and Reconciliation restores life when it is broken, Confirmation strengthens that life by the gifts of the Holy Spirit. It is about strengthening what God has given, and continues to give, to his sons and daughters.

In the Sacrament of Confirmation, the Holy Spirit completes the grace of baptism and offers the newly confirmed strength as a true witness of Christ. Thus, the newly confirmed is "more strictly obliged to spread and defend the faith by word and deed" Thus, the Holy Spirit completes what was begun at baptism.

The Sacrament of Confirmation helps a person remain faithful to his or her baptismal commitment to witness to Christ and to serve others. The gifts of the Holy Spirit associated with Confirmation are strengths (or virtues) that Christian living requires if it is to be fruitful and complete. Thus wisdom, understanding, knowledge, counsel, fortitude, piety, and fear of the Lord, are divine aids to Christian living without which fulfilling one's baptismal calling would be far more difficult, if not impossible.

Perhaps we don't recognize these qualities as gifts of strength because they have become a part of our Christian living and appear quite natural—a fact that affirms how closely the Holy Spirit works with us.

And I am thankful to my Church for taking all the pains and efforts inspite of this Pandemic to give us the best co-ordinators who taught us via online every Sunday without fail and saw to each one of us that we understood every concept clearly through their teachings. I now know the importance of being confirmed in Christ

We then had the Holy Eucharist, which was celebrated by Fr. Suniel Pinto. After a sumptuous lunch, Br. # From the SVP Desk - A Glimpse of the Activities

The Conference (SSVP) is headed by the newly re-elected President Mrs. Clementine Rodrigues and her team of 12 dedicated members. We reach out in three ways: ration aid, educational aid and medical aid, the details of which are as under:

## **Ration Aid:**

Christmas hampers were distributed to 15 families with ration items, cake and cotton masks.

All items collected at the offertory during the Holy Eucharist were distributed to adopted families and those in dire need. We distribute ration on the second Sunday of every month.

The SVP members joined a few volunteers from the parish to provide assistance in kind to Mukta Jivan Society, a Leprosy Relief and Rehabilitation Center run by the Society of the Helpers of Mary at Sahapur. Rice, wheat, dal, sugar, oil, potatoes, oats, adult diapers, bath soaps, washing soaps, hair oil, Dettol liquid and tooth paste collected from the parishioners were given to the ashram.

## **Educational Aid:**

One family was provided with a computer through the contacts of Br. Thomas. Further, a lady from Malankara Church was helped to pay the fees of General Nursing course.

Educational aid was given to a girl college student, one of the adopted family members.

Education aid was provided to a deserving girl at Sakinaka on recommendation by the Area Council (N/E). Also to a few families of our own parish.

## **Medical Aid:**

Members contributed individually for a resident of Karave Gaon for his knee surgery at Tata Hospital. He had met with an accident in

January 2022. Timely follow up is being done. One individual was given financial help for cataract surgery too.

Medical aid was arranged through a donor to a Muslim woman who is HIV positive and was abandoned by her own brother. The donor has agreed to meet all educational expenses of the child at least for a few more years.

## **Other:**

Coordination and collaboration with OLCM (Office of Lay Collaboration in Ministry) in receiving feedback about the presence of the church in the midst of people (Towards a Synodal Church). Twenty adopted family members (mostly non-Catholics) expressed their gratitude for a great helping hand by the church in Seawoods and some expressed their desire to give back to the society for what they have received.

The members conducted First Friday adoration at the church with prayers and hymns.

The feast of our patron Saint Vincent de Paul was celebrated during the Holy Eucharist on 3rd October 2021. A power point presentation was shown on the life of St. Vincent de Paul.

A cancer patient from Karave was provided with an instrument for wet and dry segregation as he deals with garbage segregation and selling of junk goods.

We are called to reach out to the needy as His extended hands. As most of the members are retired, we need labourers in His vineyard. We earnestly request dedicated young men and women to join us to continue this good work through Sunday meetings, house visits and investigation to distribute aid and to reach out to the poorest of the poor given in our care.

## “Did not our hearts burn within us?” – Lk. 24: 32

The Holy week is the highest point in a Christian's liturgical life. In this week we re-live our Blessed Lord's Passion, Death & Resurrection, the foundation of our faith. But is it in this week alone that we re-live His Passion, Death & Resurrection? The answer is No. We do it at every Mass. The Eucharist or the Mass is our participation in that One Eternal Sacrifice of Calvary which began in the Upper Room and which by His Ascension has been made transcendent through Time & Space as is explained in the Letter to the Hebrews.

So, if we participate in and not simply re-live the Passion, Death & Resurrection of Our Blessed Lord as a past event, then what should be our disposition? To understand that we need to go back to the First Mass. Many Catholics would say that the first mass was the Last Supper and they're not entirely wrong. After all, on Holy Thursday, the Lord did institute the Holy Eucharist. But the Lord was present in flesh & blood physically. When He said the words of institution, no one out of the twelve, ate off His Body or sucked His blood. I would propose, the First Mass as we understand it today was on the Road to Emmaus. The words of institution (in fact we have a glimpse of it in the Bread of Life Discourse in Jn. 6: 61-62) make real sense only after the Resurrection and Ascension.

Jesus had to play it out and He does so

when He interprets to them in all the scriptures the things concerning Himself (Lk. 24:27). After that as the sun sets, He sits with the disciples at table where He takes, blesses, breaks the bread & gives it to them. The same 4 actions in the same order in Lk. 9:16 & Jn. 6:11 in the feeding of the five thousand as well as in Lk. 22:19, in the institution and their eyes were opened (Lk. 24:31). Do you see the two-fold structure? What was the reaction of Cleopas and his companion? Their hearts were burning within them (Lk. 24:32). This should be our disposition when we encounter the Risen (& ascended) Lord in the Eucharist.

Many of us miss out on another thing and personally I guess it is because this story is narrated either on the 2nd or 3rd Sunday of Easter whereas the event in its historical context took place on Easter Sunday itself (“that very day... Lk. 24:13”). Jesus gave us the structure of the Mass on Easter Sunday. His first order of business as it were after His resurrection was to show us how He was going to be with us, in Word & Sacrament. Every time when we leave the Church after attending the Mass, we must echo the words of Cleopas, “Did not our hearts burn within us?”
